#### **President's Message**

It's official. Chicago now has a street named for an African-American woman! I just returned from the ceremony at the Harold Washington Library to unveil the new street signs for Ida B. Wells Drive. Mayor Emanuel and President Preckwinkle were on hand to speak along with a host of other activists who described why this journalist, teacher, anti-lynching crusader, women's rights activist and civil rights pioneer needs to be remembered by every Chicagoan, as well as every American. I had tears in my eyes as I listened to Ida's greatgranddaughter Michelle Duster, who teaches at Columbia College. Thank you to all AAUW members who helped to bring this about.

As a reminder, Chicago Branch members Eleida Gomez and Gerry Oberman are promoting the idea of honoring suffragists on voting day in 2020 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Women's Suffrage by placing flowers and "Here lies a suffragist" signs on their gravesites. I urge you to volunteer for the committee that will be identifying and locating the gravesites of suffragists buried in the Chicago area.

Now that we have all weathered some of the coldest January temperatures on record, I hope you are warmed up to the idea of attending several upcoming programs that support the mission of AAUW. On March 21st, Nadiah Mohajir will describe her AAUW-funded project to help college campuses address the unique challenges facing Muslim women in reporting sexual assaults. She is the founder and Executive Director of HEART Women & Girls, a non-profit organization that promotes sexual health education in Muslim communities. On March 28th, you are invited to join women from around the Chicago area in Daley Plaza for this year's Equal Pay Day Rally. Then, on April 13th, we will meet at the headquarters of the Jane Addams Resource Corporation, a non-profit company that is providing skills training to displaced workers to prepare them for manufacturing jobs in the Ravenswood neighborhood. Regan Brewer will tell us about the history of this unique organization, and what they are doing currently to connect local residents with the training needed for today's job market.

As the third installment in my series to highlight AAUW's Strategic Plan, let's look at the third mission-based focal area, which is Leadership. The two goals associated with this area are A: Bolster the participation of girls and women in leadership roles throughout their lives; and B: Advance the number of women in leadership particularly in education and nonprofit organizations. To achieve Goal A, the Association intends to empower early and midcareer women to succeed in leadership opportunities and to expand leadership opportunities for women over 55 years of age. As an example, being active in your local AAUW Branch provides opportunities for leadership. For Goal B, the plan calls for AAUW to become a national resource on the impact of leadership development activities for the advancement of women into leadership roles and to increase the inclusion and numbers of women serving on governing and advisory boards. Wouldn't it be great if five years from now, newspapers and policy makers looked to an AAUW-developed rating system that measured the advancement of women in leadership roles.

# A New Branch Activity: Honor a Suffragist on Voting Day

In preparation for the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Woman's Suffrage in 2020, the National Women's History Project (NWHP) located in Santa Rosa, California has inaugurated the

*"Honor a Suffragist on Voting Day"* project. AAUW-Chicago, Inc. will join with many other national women's organizations to help identify, locate the gravesite, and honor the suffragists in the Chicago area. Acting as an "Everyday Historian", Branch members are

invited to join a committee which will meet in mid-March, 2019 to plan our efforts to contribute to this project. Once identified, our list will be added to a national registry for suffrage sites to ensure they are remembered and celebrated for years to come. Locally,

we can decide to honor our suffragists by placing a flower or some other token on their gravesite as well as a sign labeled, "Here lies a Suffragist" so others will recognize their accomplishments. (<u>Notes</u>: the NWHP has already provided us with a list to work from and we have located the gravesites of the following: Jane Addams, Frances E. Willard, Louise de Koven Bowen, Julia Clifford Lathrop, and Kate F. O'Connor. A Biographical Dictionary titled, "Women Building Chicago 1790 – 1990" also contains an important index listing of suffrage activists for this project. Chicago has many organizations that can serve us as sources.).
